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### **Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book**

#### Introduction: Health and Health Care in Rural and Frontier Nevada

The Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book — Ninth Edition contains a wide range of current county-level information on the resident population, economy, social environment, population health, health workforce, and the health care delivery system. It includes important data for public policy makers, health care professionals and administrators, rural health care advocates, and equally important, the residents of rural and frontier Nevada. The primary purpose of this data book is to provide the most current and accurate data for these audiences, as well as for those interested in learning more about health and health care in Nevada.

Utilizing over 50 sources of public and private data, most tables provide county level data aggregated at the regional level highlighting important distinctions between rural and urban regions of the state. In some cases, the only available data is regional in nature (e.g., HIV/AIDS prevalence rates). In other instances, the data counts for individual rural and frontier counties are suppressed by the data-collecting agency for confidentiality or other reasons (e.g., vital statistic rates). Regardless, the expressed intent of this publication is to highlight important differences among the urban, rural, and frontier areas of the state.

With the state's ever-changing demography, economy, and health care delivery system, some of the data are in flux and, thus, must be approached with caution. In some cases, the information is not updated on a regular basis. Consequently, the "most current" available data likely understates county and regional trends (e.g., uninsured estimates). Nonetheless, all of the information presented in this volume is, to our best knowledge, the most current available.

The *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* — Ninth Edition is divided into six major sections containing the most current data on:

- Demographic characteristics of rural and frontier Nevada, including recent population estimates and projections;
- The social and economic characteristics of rural and frontier Nevada, including data on income, economic indicators, poverty, and educational attainment;
- Health insurance coverage in rural and frontier Nevada, including data on Medicare and Medicaid coverage;
- Population health status in rural and frontier Nevada;
- The health care workforce in rural and frontier Nevada, including estimates and projections for many licensed health care occupations across the major regions of the state; and
- Health care resources and the economics of health care in rural and frontier Nevada.

The majority of tables contained in the *Data Book* are organized into two broad categories: (1) rural and frontier counties and (2) urban counties. Rural and frontier counties include Churchill, Douglas, Elko, Esmeralda, Eureka,

Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Lyon, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, and White Pine Counties. Urban counties include Carson City, and Clark and Washoe Counties.

Provider-to-population ratios, insurance enrollment rates, and other population-based ratios and calculations utilize population estimates certified by the Nevada State Demographer's Office for any given year. Some of the population estimates presented in this *Data Book* and utilized in the aforementioned denominators vary slightly from those published later in the same year. Numbers and percentages presented throughout the data book may not add up due to rounding. Dollar figures and estimates are noted below the tables as to whether they have been adjusted for inflation. A complete list of data sources is contained at the end of this report, as well as endnotes providing additional information on data and data sources.

Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book — Ninth Edition details important differences among rural, frontier, and urban areas of Nevada. These differences impact population health, the availability of hospital and other health care resources, and access to health care services between rural and frontier and urban areas. For example, the age distribution of a county has a significant influence on the health status and health care needs of a population. The population age distribution within a county may affect available resources for local residents (e.g., proportion of county income from Social Security and other transfer payments) and health care providers (e.g., number and percent of Medicare-eligible residents).

All things being equal, rural counties tend to have an older population than urban counties. An older population, in turn, is typically at a greater risk of death and disability than a younger population, and uses a disproportionately larger share of health care resources. In general, urban, rural and frontier areas possess important differences in demographics, economics, and social characteristics, which produce differences in health priorities, population health, health-related behaviors, the delivery of health services, and access to health care. For example, research has consistently documented higher levels of obesity and smoking prevalence, lower levels of health insurance coverage, and greater barriers to accessing health care services in rural versus urban areas. Thus, it is not surprising that rural areas have significantly higher age-adjusted all-cause mortality rates and cause-specific mortality rates than urban areas.

#### **Defining Rural and Frontier**

The definition of what is and is not a "rural" area is no mere academic matter. Indeed, policy makers utilize different, and in some cases competing, classification schemes to target programs, services, and projects to populations in Nevada and the United States. The classification scheme adopted by the Nevada State Office of Rural Health and utilized in this edition of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* emphasizes the important distinctions between "rural" and "frontier" regions of the state. This classification scheme was developed by the National Center for Frontier Communities (NCFC) with input from state health planners and rural health professionals throughout the country.

The Center's classification scheme distinguishes certain areas of the country as being more remote than rural areas. The Center's classification scheme represents an improvement over previous schemes that defined "frontier" simply in terms of population density, where counties with a population density of six or less persons per square mile were defined as "frontier." Frontier counties are different from rural counties by being more remote in terms of travel time and distance from the nearest population centers with more specialized medical


care and facilities. Additional information on the Center's classification scheme and methodology can be found at www.frontierus.org.

Map 1 highlights the three urban counties (Carson City, Clark County, and Washoe County), three rural counties (Douglas, Lyon, and Storey Counties), and the remaining eleven frontier counties. It also indicates the location of Nevada's major towns, cities, and county seats. According to population estimates prepared by the Nevada State Demographer's Office, 2.8 million Nevadans or 90.5% of the state's population reside in the state's three urban counties. Approximately 73.4% of the state's population resides in Clark County (Las Vegas metropolitan area) alone and 15.3% in Washoe County (Reno-Sparks metropolitan area). In comparison, an estimated 288,744 Nevadans or 9.5% of Nevada's population reside in the state's rural and frontier counties. The rural and frontier population spreads over 95,431 square miles or 86.9% of the state's land mass.


Map 1 also provides a current snapshot of the major health care services available to rural and frontier residents of Nevada. This map excludes the offices of physicians, emergency medical services agencies, or other individual health providers. While most of the state's tertiary care centers are concentrated in the state's three urban counties, a diverse range of acute care hospital services, outpatient clinics, and medical services are scattered across twelve of the state's fourteen rural and frontier counties (exceptions are Storey and Esmeralda counties where there are no health care facilities). These facilities and services — highlighted in greater detail throughout this data book — provide most of the basic health care received by our state's rural and frontier populations.

Map 2 illustrates the considerable heterogeneity of Nevada's population and geography utilizing "Rural-Urban Commuting Areas" or "RUCA" codes ranging from 1 (the red shaded, core urbanized areas) to 10 (the blue shaded, mostly frontier, isolated areas of the state). The RUCA methodology provides a more fine-grained classification of rural areas applicable at both the county and sub-county units of analysis. Map 2 underscores the concentration of most of the state's population in zip code areas located in the northwestern and southern counties of the state (RUCAs 1-2), and the dispersion of the remaining 10 percent of the population is scattered across a vast geographic expanse of rural and frontier regions of the state (RUCAs 4-10). There are no areas of Nevada with a RUCA code of 3, 6, or 9.

Map 2 also highlights the considerable variation within counties. For example, the urban counties of Clark County and Washoe County contain substantial areas that are rural or frontier in nature; conversely rural and frontier counties such as Lyon and Nye Counties possess comparatively small urban areas or zip codes that are economically integrated with urban centers in the state. Map 3 highlights the unique topography and vast distances separating the state's rural communities from the urban centers. Most rural and frontier communities are located in sparsely populated counties that are considerable distances from the state's urban and tertiary health care centers. The average distance between acute care hospitals in rural Nevada and the next level of care or tertiary care hospital is 109 miles and the average distance to the nearest incorporated town is 43 miles. Consequently, the primary health care delivery issue for rural and frontier residents and communities in Nevada is how best to overcome the spatial isolation and enormous geographic distances that characterize most rural and frontier communities in Nevada.


Nevada comprises the western half of our nation's Great Basin. Ridge after ridge of rugged, brown mountains are broken up with flat sage covered valleys. The Great Basin is a high desert defined by 150 mountain ranges running north to south and earthquake activity second only to Hawai'i. Most mountain passes are subject to very difficult seasonal weather conditions. Most major roads follow the north to south pattern with two major exceptions. U.S. Highway 50 — "the loneliest highway in America" — across the middle of the state winds through numerous mountain summits. Interstate 80 curves northeast across the state largely following the railroad tracks built in the 1870's. Travel time from most county hospitals to regional medical centers is thus measured in hours not minutes. Driving long distances is a very daunting task to obtain emergency health care in winter conditions. Helicopter pads are located at all rural hospitals for emergency transport to/from either Reno, Las Vegas, or other emergency care centers.

Map 4 details public and private land ownership in Nevada. Approximately 10 percent of land is privately owned (shaded black). The remaining 90 percent is publicly owned and administered by a wide range of federal, state, and tribal entities. The major administrators of public lands in Nevada are the Bureau of Land Management, Departments of Defense and Energy, and the U.S. Forest Service. The checkerboard pattern along Interstate 80 and the Humboldt River in Northern Nevada highlights a large swath of land owned either by the Bureau of Land Management or the railroad company's land grants.


Map 5 highlights the enormous geographic expanse of the state — Nevada is the 7<sup>th</sup> largest state in the U.S. — by comparing it with selected northeastern states. Nevada's land mass is approximately 110,000 square miles. By comparison, seven northeastern states with a combined land mass of 47,820 square miles would easily fit within Nevada's borders.

- Utilization trends and financial performance among the state's rural and frontier hospitals

## Section One: Demographic Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Ninth Edition provides a wide range of current data on demographic indicators by county and region in Nevada. Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- The current population of Nevada is 3,055,076 including 288,744 residents in the state's fourteen rural and frontier counties (Table 1.1).
- The population in Nevada is projected to grow from 3,055,076 in 2019 to 3,231,166 in 2029 (5.8%) (Table 1.1).
- Over the next decade, the population of rural and frontier Nevada is projected to grow by 16,056 or 5.6% —
   10 rural and frontier counties are projected to increase population, and 4 counties are projected to lose
   population (Table 1.1).
- Currently, 9.5% of the state's population resides in rural and frontier areas, as compared to 90.5% residing in the state's 3 urban counties — 2.2 million residents or 73.4% of the state's population resides in Clark County alone (Table 1.2).
- While rural and frontier counties represent only 9.5% of the state's population, these counties cover 86.9% of the state's land mass or 95,431 square miles (Table 1.2).
- Currently, there are 27.8 people per square mile in Nevada. Population density ranges from 0.3 persons per square mile in Esmeralda County to 392.5 persons per square mile in Carson City (Table 1.2).
- Between 2007 and 2017, the population of rural and frontier Nevada declined by 2,756 or 1.0% 7 rural and frontier counties increased population, while 7 lost population (Table 1.3).
- Between 2007 and 2017, 3 of the 5 fastest growing counties in Nevada were rural and frontier: Eureka County (32.5%), Lincoln County (23.6%), Clark County (12.3%), White Pine County (11.6%), and Washoe County (8.1%) (Table 1.3).
- Currently, 23.5% of the state's population is 17 and under, 61.3% are between 18 and 64 years of age, and 15.1% are 65 and over (Table 1.4).
- In general, rural counties possess older populations versus urban counties for example, 7 rural and frontier counties have more people aged 65 and over than people 17 years of age and under (Table 1.4).
- From 2000 to 2016, the median age has increased in every county of Nevada the state average increased from 35.7 years in 2000 to 37.5 years in 2016 (Table 1.5).

- In 2016, among rural and frontier counties, the median age ranged from 33.5 years in Elko County to 54.4 years in Storey County; by comparison, among urban counties, the median age ranged from 36.7 years in Clark County to 43.1 in Carson City (Table 1.5).
- The number of residents aged 17 and under in Nevada is projected to decrease from 721,481 in 2019 to 713,376 in 2029 a decrease of 8,105 or 1.1% (Table 1.6).
- For the next five years, the growth rate in the population aged 17 and under in rural and frontier counties (8.4%) is projected to be higher than urban counties (-1.1%) (Table 1.6).
- The number of residents between the ages of 18 and 64 in Nevada is projected to increase from 1,879,217 in 2019 to 1,923,720 in 2029 an increase of 44,503 or 2.4% (Table 1.7).
- For the next ten years, the growth rate in the population aged 18 to 64 in rural and frontier counties is projected to decline by 4.1%, as compared to an increase in urban counties of 3.0% (Table 1.7).
- The number of residents aged 65 and over in Nevada is projected to increase from 452,882 in 2019 to 567,662 in 2029 an increase of 114,780 or 25.3% (Table 1.8).
- For the next ten years, the growth rate in the population aged 65 and over in rural and frontier counties (12.3%) is projected to be lower to that of urban counties (27.3%) (Table 1.8).
- The population aged 65 and over is expected to increase in 11 of 14 rural and frontier counties over the next ten years overall, the number of residents aged 65 and over in rural and frontier Nevada is projected to increase by 7,468 or 12.3% through 2029 (Table 1.8).
- In 2019, the largest non-white population group are those of Hispanic origin (911,372) in Nevada, of which 47,745 reside in rural and frontier counties (Table 1.9).
- In general, urban areas of Nevada are more racially and ethnically diverse than rural and frontier regions for example, 75.2% of rural and frontier residents are white, as compared to 47.9% in urban counties (Table 1.10).
- Hispanic residents represent 16.5% of the population in rural and frontier counties and 31.2% in urban counties of Nevada (Table 1.10).
- Hispanic residents are a growing segment of the population in 14 out of 17 counties in Nevada the
  percent of the population of Hispanic origin ranges from 5.8% in Storey County to 28.1% in Humboldt
  County. The Hispanic population in urban counties ranges from 21.9% in Carson City to 32.7% in Clark
  County (Table 1.10 and 1.11).
- Between 2019 and 2029, the Hispanic population in Nevada is projected to increase by 149,166 or 16.4% the growth rate in urban counties (16.5%) is projected to exceed that of rural counties (14.8%) (Table 1.11).
- Currently, there are 206,228 military veterans in Nevada, representing 6.8% of the state's population (Table 1.12).

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- There are 27,753 veterans residing in rural and frontier counties of Nevada rural veterans represent 13.5% of all veterans in Nevada and 9.7% of the total population of rural and frontier Nevada (Table 1.12).
- The percent of the population who are military veterans ranges from 5.5% in Elko County to 13.8% in Eureka County in rural and frontier areas, as compared to a range of 6.3% in Clark County to 8.8% in Carson City in urban areas (Table 1.12).
- According to the Veterans Health Administration, the veteran population is projected to decline in every
  county in Nevada between 2018 and 2028 over the next ten years, the number of veterans in Nevada is
  expected to decline from 206,228 in 2018 to 176,262 in 2028 (14.5%) (Table 1.13).
- In 2016, an estimated 729,878 residents of Nevada were born in Nevada (26.2% of the population), 1.5 million residents were born in the U.S. outside of Nevada (54.2%), and 547,696 were born in another country (19.6%) (Table 1.14).
- In general, rural areas possess slightly greater percentages of native-born residents than urban regions of Nevada 27.5% of rural and frontier residents are native-born, as compared to 26.0% in urban counties (Table 1.14).
- A much greater proportion of foreign-born residents are in the urban counties of Nevada than in rural and frontier counties. The foreign-born population ranges from 0.4% of the total population in Eureka County to 12.5% in Lander County in rural and frontier areas; from 11.9% in Carson City to 22.5% in Clark County in urban areas of the state (Table 1.14).
- Currently, there are 13,181 prisoners in State of Nevada correctional facilities 34.8% of the prison population or 4,590 prisoners are incarcerated in facilities located in rural and frontier counties (Table 1.15).

## Section Two: Social and Economic Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Ninth Edition provides a wide range of current data on social and economic indicators by county and region in Nevada. Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- In 2017, county-level per capita personal income in rural and frontier Nevada ranged from \$32,944 in Pershing County to \$69,188 in Douglas County the average per capita income for all rural and frontier counties (\$43,707) was below the urban average of \$49,567, and below the U.S. average of \$51,640 (Table 2.1).
- In 2017, county-level per capita personal income in rural and frontier areas as a percent of the Nevada average per capita personal income ranged from 71.4% in Pershing County to 149.9% in Douglas County (Table 2.1).
- In 2017, county-level per capita personal income in rural and frontier areas as a percent of the U.S. average per capita personal income ranged from 63.8% in Pershing County to 134.0% in Douglas County (Table 2.1).
- From 2007 to 2017, per capita personal income in Nevada increased from \$40,159 to \$46,159 during the same decade, per capita personal income in rural and frontier counties increased from \$33,802 to \$43,707 (Table 2.2).
- Rural and frontier counties vary considerably in terms of the percent of personal income by source. For example, transfer payments as a percent of total personal income ranged from 12.2% in Lander County to 37.3% in Mineral County (Table 2.3).
- Nevada rural and frontier counties had varying percentages in transfer payments from the following sources: 35.9% in retirement and disability insurance payments; 55.0% in medical benefits (Medicare, Medicaid, and VA health care); 6.7% in income maintenance benefits; 1.1% in unemployment benefits; and 1.4% from other sources (Table 2.4).
- In 2016, average median family income in Nevada was \$62,528 or 92.1% of the U.S. average of \$67,871 (Tables 2.5).
- Median family income in 2016 among rural and frontier counties of Nevada ranged from \$43,681 in Esmeralda County to \$106,597 in Eureka County (Table 2.5).
- In 2016, 7 of 14 rural and frontier counties had a median family income above the state average of \$62,528 and 6 of 14 rural and frontier counties were above the U.S. average of \$67,871 (Table 2.5).

- In 2016, median household income in Nevada was \$53,094 or 96.0% of the U.S. average of \$55,322 (Table 2.5).
- Median household income among rural and frontier counties in Nevada ranged from \$37,750 in Mineral County to \$78,077 in Lander County in 2016 (Table 2.5).
- In 2016, 7 of 14 rural and frontier counties had a median household income above the state average of \$53,094 and 7 of 14 were above the U.S. average of \$55,322 (Table 2.5).
- In 2017, there were 407,308 Nevadans in poverty (14.1% of the state's population) there were 33,165 rural and frontier residents in poverty (11.7% of the population) (Table 2.6).
- In 2017, there were 132,012 children in poverty in Nevada (19.9% of children aged 17 and under) there were 10,447 children in poverty in rural and frontier counties (18.3%) (Table 2.6).
- Between 2007 and 2017, the number and percent of population in poverty increased in all 17 Nevadan counties (Table 2.7).
- From 2007 to 2017, the number of Nevadans in poverty increased by 139,476 or 52.1% growth in poverty was greater in urban counties (55.2%) than rural and frontier counties (24.2%). (Table 2.7).
- From 2007 to 2017, the number of children in poverty in Nevada increased by 35,503 or 36.8% growth in child poverty was greater in urban counties (38.5%) than rural and frontier counties (19.7%). (Table 2.7).
- In 2018, 448,045 Nevadans or 15.0% of the state's population participated in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), including 32,642 or 11.4% of rural and frontier residents (Table 2.8).
- Between 2010 and 2018, the number and the percent of population participating in SNAP increased in every county in Nevada — growth in SNAP participation was greater in urban counties (40.4%) compared to rural and frontier counties (19.4%) (Table 2.8).
- In 2017, 254,953 students or 53.8% of the total student population qualified for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program in Nevada, including 18,029 students or 22.2% of the total student population in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.9).
- Among rural and frontier counties of Nevada, student qualifying for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program ranged from 6.1% of the student population in Storey County to 75.1% in Nye County (Table 2.9).
- In 2017, there were 439,036 students enrolled in K-12 schools in Nevada (public and private), including 41,852 students enrolled in schools in rural and frontier areas of the state (Table 2.10).
- In 2018, the average public expenditure on education in Nevada was \$9,389 per pupil among rural and frontier counties per pupil spending ranged from \$10,647 in Lyon County to \$33,263 in Esmeralda County (Table 2.11).

- In 2017, the average high school graduation rate in Nevada was 80.9% among Nevada's 17 counties, the graduation rate ranged from 69.9% in White Pine County to 100.0% in Eureka County and Pershing County (Table 2.12).
- On average in 2017, the high school graduation rate in Nevada for females is 84.6%, as compared to 77.3% for males (Table 2.12).
- In 2016, 85.4% of Nevadans aged 25 and older graduated from high school, 23.2% had a bachelor's degree or higher, and 7.9% had a master's degree or higher (Table 2.13).
- Urban and rural areas of Nevada, in 2016, had similar high school graduation rates. However, the percent of population, aged 25 and over with a bachelor's degree, was lower in rural and frontier areas of the state (16.6%) when compared to urban areas (24.3%), and the percent of population with a master's degree or higher was lower in rural areas (5.8%) versus urban areas (8.1%) (Table 2.13).
- In 2018, there were 1,755,311 registered voters out of an eligible voting population of 2,270,565 (78.2%), including 180,173 registered voters in rural and frontier counties out of an eligible population of 224,744 (80.2%) (Table 2.14).
- County-level voter registration rates in Nevada range from 62.7% in Lander County to 95.7% in Douglas County (Table 2.14).
- Currently, registered Republicans outnumber registered Democrats in 16 of 17 counties in Nevada however, there are 32.6% registered Republicans, as compared to 38.4% registered Democrats in Nevada. Additionally, there are 28.9% Nevadans registered as Independent, Non-partisan, or with another party affiliation (Table 2.15).
- In 2010, the percent of population participating in the U.S. Decennial Census was 71%, in Nevada, which is lower than the U.S. average of 74% county-level participation rates ranged from 32% in Esmeralda County to 85% in Storey County (Table 2.16).
- There are 1,264 community organizations in Nevada or 42.8 community organizations per 100,000 population the number ranges from 33.7 in Clark County to 95.9 in Lander County. The U.S. participation rate of 95.8 per 100,000 population is more than twice the Nevada rate (Table 2.16).
- In 2015, the most prevalent violent crime in Nevada was aggravated assault with 13,591 reported incidents. The most common property crime in Nevada was larceny/theft with 47,569 reported incidents (Tables 2.18 through 2.19).
- In 2015, the rate of reported violent crimes per 100,000 population in Nevada was 775.3 county-level rates ranged from 0.0 in Esmeralda County to 1,013.4 in Mineral County (Table 2.20).
- In 2015, the rate of reported property crimes per 100,000 population in Nevada was 2,930.0 county-level rates ranged from 758.4 in Esmeralda County to 3,174.2 in Clark County (Table 2.20).

## Section Three: Health Insurance Coverage in Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Ninth Edition provides a wide range of current data on health insurance coverage by county and region in Nevada. For additional data on health insurance coverage and trends over time, please visit the *Nevada Instant Atlas* at <a href="https://www.med.unr.edu/atlas">www.med.unr.edu/atlas</a>.

Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- In 2016, there were 323,527 uninsured Nevadans (10.9%), including 27,828 uninsured rural and frontier residents or 10.0% (Table 3.1).
- In 2016, 13.1% of Nevadans under the age of 65 were uninsured, including 11.1% rural and frontier residents (Table 3.2).
- Between 2008 and 2016, the number of uninsured Nevadans under the age of 65 decreased by 205,564 or 38.9% — the number of uninsured Nevadans decreased in all 17 counties (Table 3.3).
- Between 2008 and 2016, the number of uninsured Nevadans in rural and frontier counties decreased by 24,123 or 46.4% (Table 3.3).
- There were 50,133 uninsured Nevadans under the age of 19 (7.2%) in 2016, including 5,744 uninsured rural and frontier children (9.3%) (Table 3.4).
- In 2016, 120,032 uninsured Nevadans under the age of 65 were below 138% of the federal poverty level (FPL) including 9,742 or 22.1% of uninsured rural and frontier residents under the age of 65 and below 138% FPL (Table 3.5).
- Currently, there are 656,744 Nevadans enrolled in Medicaid, including 50,996 rural and frontier residents (Table 3.6).
- Between 2013 and 2018, Nevada Medicaid enrollment has increased by 256,953 or 64.3%, including enrollment growth of 18,229 (55.6%) in rural and frontier counties (Table 3.6).
- Between 2013 and 2018, Nevada Check Up (Nevada's Children's Health Insurance Program) enrollment has
  increased by 5,884, as compared to rural and frontier counties where enrollment increased by 500 (Table
  3.7).
- Currently, there are 507,774 Nevadans enrolled in Medicare, including 66,652 rural and frontier residents (Table 3.8).

- From 2013 to 2018, the number of Medicare enrollees in Nevada increased by 94,301 or 22.8% in rural and frontier counties the number of Medicare enrollees increased by 10,478 or 18.7% (Table 3.8).
- From 2013 to 2018, the number of Medicare Advantage (Part C) enrollees in Nevada increased by 55,212 or 42.6% — in rural and frontier counties the number of Medicare Advantage enrollees increased by 4,365 or 43.7% (Table 3.9).
- From 2013 to 2018, the number of Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (Part D) enrollees in Nevada increased by 92,048 or 35.3% in rural and frontier counties the number of Medicare Prescription Drug Plan enrollees increased by 10,163 or 31.5% (Table 3.10).
- In 2016, there were 109,438 Nevadans enrolled in the Veterans Health Administration this figure represents 46.3% of all veterans in Nevada. In rural and frontier Nevada, there were 15,108 (27.8%) veterans enrolled in the Veterans Health Administration (Table 3.11).
- During 2016, 72,814 veterans in Nevada used health care services delivered by the Veterans Health Administration this figure represents 30.8% of all veterans in Nevada. In rural and frontier Nevada, 10,494 (19.3%) veterans used the Veterans Health Administration (Table 3.11).
- Over the past decade, the number of Native Americans using tribal health services in Nevada grew from 17,634 in 2007 to 20,458 in 2017 an increase of 2,824 or 16.0% (Table 3.12).

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Ninth Edition provides a wide range of current data on population health indicators by county and region in Nevada. 
Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- In terms of self-reported health status, risk factors to health, and utilization of preventive health services, there are substantial differences between rural and urban areas of Nevada. For example, residents of rural and frontier areas of the state report higher rates of diabetes, obesity, and physical inactivity than do residents of urban areas (Tables 4.1 to 4.3).
- According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 16.4% of adults in Nevada currently smoke in 2016. Adult smoking prevalence ranges from 6.4% in Lincoln County to 20.9% in Esmeralda County (Table 4.4).
- According to the CDC, 17.6% of adults in Nevada reported excessive drinking in 2016. Excessive drinking prevalence ranged from 15.6% in Esmeralda County to 23.5% in Humboldt County (Table 4.5).
- The Nevada High School Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) collects a wide range of data every two years on youth substance and alcohol use, sexual behaviors, and exposure to violence among high school students in Nevada. While youth smoking in Nevada has dropped to 6.4% of students, 15.0% of students have used vaping products (Table 4.6).
- According to the YRBS, 25.8% of high school students are sexually active. Sexual activity prevalence rates are
  higher in rural and frontier areas of the state, as compared to urban areas of the state. For example, 44.1%
  of students in Douglas County are sexually active in contrast to 24.7% in Washoe County (Table 4.7).
- According to the YRBS, nearly 1 in 6 high school students are bullied at school (16.1%) and 7.3% of students report being forced to have sex (Table 4.8).
- The National Survey on Drug Use and Health administered by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health
  Services Administration (SAMHSA) yields current data on a wide-range of self-reported mental health and
  substance abuse indicators by region in Nevada and the United States. For the population aged 18 to 25,
  data highlights various indicators of alcohol abuse and need for treatment, Nevada statewide and regional
  rates are slightly higher than national rates (Table 4.9).
- The National Survey on Drug Use and Health administered by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) yields current data on a wide-range of self-reported mental health and substance abuse indicators by region in Nevada and the United States. For the population aged 12 and

older, data highlights various indicators of alcohol abuse and need for treatment, Nevada statewide and regional rates are slightly higher than national rates (Table 4.10).


- From 2011 to 2016, the number of new cases of HIV/AIDS increased in all regions of Nevada. However, the proportion of new cases of HIV/AIDS are concentrated in urban areas of the state particularly Clark County as compared to rural and frontier counties (Table 4.11).
- Between 2011 and 2016, sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia increased substantially in Nevada and across all regions of the state. However, STD rates are much lower in rural versus urban areas of the state. For example, the chlamydia rate in rural and frontier counties (248.0 new cases per 100,000 population) is lower than Clark County (536.2) and Washoe County (493.0) (Tables 4.13 and 4.14).
- Maternal behaviors and birth outcomes vary considerably across urban and rural regions of the state. For
  example, the number of women who abstain from smoking during pregnancy is lower in rural regions of the
  state as compared to urban counties in Nevada (Table 4.15).
- Over the past four years, the overall birth rate declined in 15 of 16 counties, including 13 rural and frontier counties. During the same period, the teen birth rate declined in 10 counties in Nevada (Tables 4.17 to 4.19).
- The Nevada Department of Education (NDOE) collects data on childhood disabilities by county of residence, including data on autism spectrum disorders, learning disabilities, and speech/language/hearing impairment. In 2017, there were 122.6 disabled children per 1,000 enrolled students in Nevada. Childhood disability rates range from 61.6 in Eureka County to 154.2 in Humboldt County (Table 4.20).
- In 2016, the age-adjusted mortality rate for all causes of death in Nevada was 796.3 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 9 of 17 counties since 2009 and currently range from 422.5 in Storey County to 1,121.4 in Mineral County (Table 4.21).
- In 2016, the age-adjusted mortality rate for heart disease in Nevada was 212.6 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 5 of 13 counties since 2009 and currently range from 119.8 in Pershing County to 285.1 in Eureka County (Table 4.22).
- In 2016, the age-adjusted mortality rate for malignant neoplasms (cancer) in Nevada was 160.9 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 14 of 14 counties since 2009 and currently range from 67.3 in Storey County to 216.4 in Carson City County (there was incomplete data for 3 counties) (Table 4.23).
- In 2016, the age-adjusted mortality rate for chronic lower respiratory disease in Nevada was 59.6 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 6 of 12 counties since 2009 and currently range from 39.7 in White Pine County to 145.1 in Mineral County (there was incomplete data for 5 counties) (Table 4.24).
- In 2016, the age-adjusted mortality rate for lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer in Nevada was 39.4 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 10 of 11 counties since 2009 and currently range from 23.4 in Douglas County to 81.3 in Mineral County (there was incomplete data for 7 counties) (Table 4.25).

- In 2016, the age-adjusted mortality rate for cerebrovascular disease (stroke) in Nevada was 36.9 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 5 of 7 counties since 2009 and currently range from 12.5 in Elko County to 56.8 in Lyon County (there was incomplete data for 10 counties) (Table 4.26).
- From 2010 to 2016, age adjusted death rates for most causes of death declined in Nevada. Noteworthy increases include: Alzheimer's disease (91.2%), breast cancer in women (76.4%), diabetes mellitus (35.8%), essential hypertensive renal (52.7%), lung cancer (140.2%), and prostate cancer in men (119.8%) (Table 4.28).
- In 2016, the ten leading causes of death in Nevada were: (1) heart disease; (2) cancer; (3) chronic lower respiratory disease; (4) lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer; (5) cerebrovascular disease (stroke); (6) non-transport accidents; (7) Alzheimer's disease; (8) breast cancer in women; (9) suicide; and (10) prostate cancer in men (Table 4.29).
- In 2016, the ten leading causes of death in rural and frontier Nevada were: (1) heart disease; (2) cancer; (3) chronic lower respiratory disease; (4) lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer; (5) non-transport accidents; (6) suicide; (7) cerebrovascular disease (stroke); (8) diabetes mellitus; (9) Alzheimer's disease, and (10) breast cancer in women (Table 4.29).
- In Nevada, there are substantial differences in life expectancy and mortality across racial and ethnic groups
   differences that persist across all regions of the state. For instance, the age adjusted mortality rate for whites is 857.4 per 100,000 population, as compared to 981.2 for blacks in Nevada (Table 4.31).

## Section Five: Health Care Workforce in Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – Ninth Edition provides a wide range of current data on the health care workforce by county and region in Nevada. Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- Currently, there are 1.51 million Nevadans in the state's labor force, including 1.44 million who are employed and 67,874 who are unemployed — the average unemployment rate for 2018 was 4.5% (Table 5.1).
- In 2018, the average annual unemployment rate ranged from 2.8% in Eureka County to 5.7% in Nye County
   — across all rural counties, the unemployment rate has declined since 2010 (Table 5.2).
- In 2017, there were an estimated 118,494 Nevadans employed in the health sector, including 6,559 in rural and frontier counties 8.2% of the state's workforce is employed in the health sector (Table 5.3).
- In 2017, Nevadans employed in the health sector earned \$6.4 billion in payroll, including \$262.8 million by rural Nevadans employed in the health sector (Table 5.4).
- In 2019, there are an estimated 122,546 Nevadans employed in the health care and social assistance sector, including 53,258 employed in ambulatory health care services (43.5%), 35,900 employed in hospitals (29.3%), 13,969 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (11.4%), and 19,419 in social assistance (18.8%) (Table 5.5).
- In 2019, there are an estimated 6,530 individuals employed in the health care and social services sector in rural and frontier counties, including 1,228 employed in ambulatory health care services (18.8%), 2,125 employed in hospitals (32.5%), 660 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (10.1%), and 2,517 in social assistance (38.5%) (Table 5.5).
- In 2024, there will be a projected 140,415 Nevadans employed in the health care and social services sector
   — an increase of 17,869 jobs (14.6%) from 2019 (Table 5.5 and Table 5.6).
- In 2024, there will be a projected 6,995 rural and frontier Nevadans employed in the health care and social services sector an increase of 465 jobs (7.1%) from 2019 (Table 5.6).
- In 2018, there were 5,436 licensed allopathic physicians (MDs) in Nevada or 180.4 MDs per 100,000 population, including 208 licensed MDs in rural and frontier counties or 72.3 MDs per 100,000 population (Table 5.7).

- Over the past decade, the number of licensed MDs in Nevada increased from 4,358 in 2008 to 5,436 in 2018

   an increase of 1,078 or 24.7%. Since 2008, the number of licensed MDs per 100,000 population in Nevada increased from 159.1 in 2008 to 180.4 in 2018 however, the number of MDs per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties declined from 76.3 to 72.3 during the same period (Table 5.7).
- In 2018, there were 770 licensed osteopathic physicians (DOs) in Nevada, including 33 DOs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of DOs in Nevada has increased by 309 or 67.0% and the per 100,000 population of DOs has grown from 17.0 to 25.6 per 100,000 population (Table 5.8).
- In 2018, there were 2,673 licensed primary care physicians in Nevada (2,315 MDs and 358 DOs), including 116 primary care physicians (89 MDs and 27 DOs) in rural and frontier counties. The number of primary care physicians in rural and frontier counties is 40.3 per 100,000 population, as compared to 93.8 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 5.9).
- In 2018, there were 977 physician assistants (PAs) in Nevada, including 73 PAs in rural and frontier counties
   the number of PAs in rural and frontier counties is 25.4 per 100,000 population, as compared to 33.2 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 5.10).
- Over the past decade, the number of physician assistants (PAs) in Nevada has increased from 483 in 2008 to 977 in 2018 (102.3%) and the per 100,000 population number of PAs in Nevada has increased from 17.6 to 32.4 during the same period (Table 5.10).
- In 2018, there were 1,279 advanced practitioners of nursing (APNs) in Nevada, including 81 APNs in rural and frontier counties the number of APNs in rural and frontier counties is 28.2 per 100,000 population, as compared to 44.0 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 5.11).
- Over the past decade, the number of APNs in Nevada has increased from 505 in 2008 to 1,279 in 2018
   (153.3%) and the number per 100,000 population of APNs in Nevada has increased from 18.6 to 42.5 during
   the same period in rural and frontier counties the number of APNs per 100,000 population increased
   from 14.6 to 28.2 (Table 5.11).
- Currently, there are 21,824 licensed registered nurses (RNs) who reside in Nevada including 1,410 RNs in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.13).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed registered nurses (RNs) has increased from 17,494 in 2008 to 21,824 in 2018 (24.0%) and the number per 100,000 population of RNs in Nevada has increased from 642.4 to 724.4 during the same period (Table 5.13).
- In 2018, the number of RNs per 100,000 population ranged from 160.2 in Eureka County to 953.1 in Washoe County the average for rural and frontier counties is 490.4 RNs per 100,000 population, as compared to 749.1 in urban counties (Table 5.13).
- In 2018, there were 2,825 licensed practical nurses (LPNs) in Nevada, including 188 LPNs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of LPNs in Nevada has increased by 33 or 1.2% (Table 5.14).

- In 2018, there were 75 certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) in Nevada, including 9 CRNAs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of CRNAs in Nevada has increased by 4 or 5.6% and the number of CRNAs has decreased from 2.6 to 2.5 per 100,000 population. In rural and frontier counties, the per 100,000 population number decreased from 4.9 to 3.1 (Table 5.15).
- In 2018, there were 117 registered nurses with emergency medical services certification (EMS/RNs) in Nevada, including 27 EMS/RNs in rural and frontier counties — 23.1% of EMS/RNs work in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.16).
- In 2018, there were 7,307 certified nursing assistants (CNAs) in Nevada, including 811 CNAs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of CNAs in Nevada has increased by 1,238 or 20.4% (Table 5.17).
- Currently, there are 1,673 licensed dentists in Nevada, including 99 dentists in rural and frontier counties.
   Over the past decade, the number of licensed dentists has increased from 1,433 in 2008 to 1,673 in 2018 (16.7%) and the number of dentists in Nevada has increased from 52.7 to 55.5 per 100,000 population during the same period (Table 5.18).
- Over the past decade, the number of dentists and number of dentists per 100,000 population in rural and frontier areas has declined (Table 5.18).
- At the county level, the number of dentists per 100,000 population currently ranges from 16.1 in Lander
  County to 73.4 in Carson City (Esmeralda, Pershing and Storey Counties have no dentists) the average for
  rural and frontier counties is 34.4 dentists per 100,000 population, as compared to 57.8 in urban counties
  (Table 5.18).
- In 2018, there were 986 licensed registered dental hygienists in Nevada, including 100 dental hygienists in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of dental hygienists in Nevada has decreased by 6 or 0.6% (Table 5.19).
- In 2018, there were 666 licensed alcohol, drug, and gambling counselors in Nevada, including 72 in rural and frontier counties the number per 100,000 population in urban counties is 21.8 and 25.0 in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.20).
- In 2018, there were 852 licensed marriage and family therapists (MFTs) in Nevada, including 50 MFTs in rural and frontier counties — since 2010, the number of MFTs in Nevada has increased by 217 or 34.2% (Table 5.21).
- In 2018, there were 230 licensed clinical professional counselors (LCPCs) in Nevada, including 22 LCPCs in rural and frontier counties since 2010, the number of LCPCs in Nevada has increased by 202 or 721.4% and the number of LCPCs has increased from 1.0 to 7.6 LCPCs per 100,000 population (Table 5.22).
- In 2018, there were 239 licensed psychiatrists in Nevada 236 reside in urban Nevada and only 3 psychiatrists reside in a rural or frontier county. Since 2008, the number of psychiatrists in Nevada has increased by 54 or 29.2%, and the number of psychiatrists has increased from 6.7 to 7.8 per 100,000 population (Table 5.23).

- In 2018, there were 405 licensed psychologists in Nevada, including 10 in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of psychologists in Nevada has increased by 94 or 30.2%, yet the number of psychologists has only increased from 11.4 to 13.4 per 100,000 population (17.5%) (Table 5.24).
- In 2018, there were 818 licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) in Nevada, including 50 LCSWs in rural and frontier counties the average for rural and frontier counties is 17.4 LCSWs per 100,000 population, as compared to 28.2 in urban counties (Tables 5.26 and 5.27).
- Currently, there are 2,332 licensed pharmacists in Nevada, including 121 pharmacists in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.28).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed pharmacists has increased from 1,933 in 2006 to 2,332 in 2016 (20.6%). The number per 100,000 population of pharmacists in Nevada has increased from 76.7 to 80.2 during the same period however, the number and number per 100,000 population of pharmacists in rural and frontier areas of the state has remained flat over the past decade (Table 5.28).
- In 2016, there were 5,900 licensed pharmaceutical technicians in Nevada, including 437 pharmaceutical technicians in rural and frontier counties since 2006, the number of pharmaceutical technicians in Nevada has increased by 2,970 or 101.3% and the number of pharmaceutical technicians as grown from 116.3 to 202.8 per 100,000 population (Table 5.29).
- In 2018, there were 633 licensed chiropractors in Nevada, including 47 chiropractors in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of chiropractors in Nevada has increased by 67 or 11.8% (Table 5.30).
- In 2018, there were 478 registered dietitians (RDs) in Nevada, including 26 RDs in rural and frontier counties
   only 5.4% of RDs work in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.31).
- In 2018, there were 1,408 paramedics in Nevada, including 186 paramedics in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.32).
- In 2018, there were 46.7 paramedics per 100,000 population in Nevada the number of paramedics per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties is 64.7, as compared to 44.8 in urban counties (Table 5.33).
- In 2018, there were 4,318 licensed massage therapists in Nevada, including 200 licensed massage therapists in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.34).
- In 2018, there were 2,238 licensed medical laboratory technologists and technicians in Nevada only 104 (4.6%) of all laboratory technologists and technicians work in rural and frontier counties (Tables 5.35).
- Across all types of licensed medical laboratory personnel laboratory directors, supervisors, technologists, technicians, and assistants the number per 100,000 population in rural areas of Nevada are substantially lower than those of urban areas. For example, there are 36.2 laboratory technologists and technicians per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties versus 78.3 in urban counties (Table 5.36).
- Currently, there are 764 occupational therapists (OTs) in Nevada, including 37 in rural and frontier counties (only 4.8% of all OTs in the state). Since 2008, the number of OTs in Nevada has increased by 329 or 75.6% and the number of OTs has grown from 16.0 to 25.4 per 100,000 population (Table 5.37).

- In 2018, there were 226 occupational therapy assistants (OTAs) in Nevada, including 12 OTAs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of OTAs in Nevada has increased by 72 or 46.8% and the number of OTAs has grown from 5.7 to 7.5 per 100,000 population (Table 5.38).
- In 2018, there were 420 licensed optometrists in Nevada, including 31 optometrists in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of licensed optometrists in Nevada has increased by 114 or 37.3% and the number of optometrists has increased from 11.3 to 13.9 per 100,000 population (23.0%) (Table 5.39).
- In 2018, there were 335 licensed dispensing opticians in Nevada, including 14 opticians in rural and frontier counties. Since 2008, the number of licensed dispensing opticians in Nevada has increased by 111 or 49.6% and the number of opticians per 100,000 population has grown from 8.2 in 2008 to 11.1 in 2018 (Table 5.40).
- In 2018, there were 158 licensed dispensing optician apprentices in Nevada, including 5 optician apprentices in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.41).
- Currently, there are 1,563 physical therapists (PTs) in Nevada, including 102 PTs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of PTs in Nevada has increased by 453 or 40.8% and the number of PTs has grown from 40.8 to 51.9 per 100,000 population (27.2%) (Table 5.42).
- In 2018, there were 598 physical therapy assistants (PTAs) in Nevada, including 28 PTAs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of PTAs in Nevada has increased by 378 or 171.8% and the number of PTAs has grown from 8.0 to 19.8 per 100,000 population (147.5%) (Table 5.43).
- In 2018, there were 115 licensed podiatrists in Nevada or 3.8 licensed podiatrists per 100,000 population, including 6 licensed podiatrists in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.44).
- Currently, there are 1,517 licensed respiratory therapists (RTs) in Nevada, including 79 RTs in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of RTs in Nevada has increased by 591 or 63.8% and the number of RTs has grown from 33.8 to 50.4 per 100,000 population (Table 5.45).
- In 2018, there were 799 licensed speech-language pathologists in Nevada, including 44 in rural and frontier counties since 2008, the number of speech-language pathologists in Nevada has increased by 284 or 55.1% and the number has grown from 18.9 to 26.5 per 100,000 population (Table 5.46).
- In general, the number of licensed health professionals per 100,000 population is lower in rural and frontier counties of Nevada versus urban areas of the state important exceptions include registered nurse anesthetists, registered dentaly hygienists, drug and alcohol counselors, and paramedics (Table 5.47).
- Currently, an estimated 2,026,181 Nevadans or 67.3% of the state's population reside in a federally-designated primary medical care health professional shortage area (HPSA) 11 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county primary medical care HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.1).
- In 2018 an estimated 234,076 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (81.4% of the population) live in a primary medical care health professional shortage area (HPSA) 11 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada are single-county primary medical care HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.1).

- Currently, an estimated 2,168,638 Nevadans or 72.0% of the state's population reside in a federally designated dental health professional shortage area (HPSA) 13 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county dental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.2).
- In 2018, an estimated 253,318 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (88.1% of the population) live in a dental health professional shortage area (HPSA) 11 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada are single-county dental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.2).
- Currently, 2.8 million Nevadans or 94.3% of the state's population reside in a federally designated mental health professional shortage area (HPSA) — 16 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county mental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.3).
- In 2018, an estimated 287,544 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (100% of the population) live in a mental health professional shortage area (HPSA) 14 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada are single-county mental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.3).








Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- Currently, there are 14 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada serving an estimated population of 288,744 residents scattered over 95,431 square miles (3.0 persons per square mile) 13 of these facilities are federally designated Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) (Table 6.1).
- On average, Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals are 56 miles from the nearest hospital and 109 miles from the nearest tertiary care hospital (Table 6.1 and Map 6.1).
- Currently, there are 5,320 licensed community hospital beds in Nevada, including 229 licensed community hospital beds in rural and frontier counties (Tables 6.2 and 6.3).
- Currently, there are 1.7 licensed community hospital beds per 1,000 population in Nevada there are 0.8 licensed community hospital beds per 1,000 population in rural and frontier counties, as compared to a rate of 1.8 in urban counties (Table 6.3).
- There are 6,634 licensed skilled nursing beds in Nevada, including 706 licensed skilled nursing beds in rural and frontier counties (Table 6.3).
- Currently, there are 2.2 licensed skilled nursing beds per 1,000 population in Nevada there are 2.4 licensed skilled nursing beds per 1,000 population in rural and frontier counties, as compared to a rate of 2.1 in urban counties (Table 6.3).
- In 2017, Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined 2,426 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$166.7 million these hospitals had an average annual salary of \$67,755 (Table 6.4).
- In 2017, Nevada's 19 urban acute care hospitals had a total 25,625 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$2.1 billion urban hospitals had an average annual salary of \$80,374 (Table 6.5).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals employed 2,426 individuals in 2017 when the jobs created in
  other businesses, resulting from hospital operating activity, are included in the analysis rural and frontier
  hospitals were responsible for an additional 1,333 jobs for a total employment impact of 3,759 jobs (Table
  6.6).

- In fiscal year 2017, Nevada's 19 urban hospitals employed 26,260 individuals when the jobs created in other businesses, resulting from hospital operating activity, are included in the analysis urban hospitals were responsible for an additional 25,228 jobs for a total employment impact of 51,488 jobs (Table 6.6).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined payroll of \$164.1 million in 2017 when the income created in other businesses, resulting from hospital operating activity, is included in the analysis, rural and frontier hospitals were responsible for an additional \$47.8 million in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$211.9 million (Table 6.7).
- In 2017, Nevada's 19 urban hospitals had a combined payroll of \$2.48 billion when the income created in other businesses, resulting from hospital operating activity, is included in the analysis, urban hospitals were responsible for an additional \$1.22 billion in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$3.70 billion (Table 6.7).
- In 2017, there were 119,151 Nevadans employed in the health sector with a combined payroll of \$6.4 billion, including 6,502 rural and frontier residents with a combined payroll of \$263 million (Tables 6.8 and 6.9).
- Businesses in Nevada's health sector employed 119,151 individuals in 2017 when the jobs created in
  other non-health sector businesses because of health sector operating activity are included in the analysis,
  Nevada's health sector was responsible for an additional 59,392 jobs for a total employment impact of
  178,543 jobs (Table 6.8).
- In 2017, businesses in the health sector in rural and frontier counties of Nevada employed 6,502 individuals

   when the jobs created in other non-health sector businesses, resulting from health sector operating activity, are included in the analysis, the rural health sector was responsible for an additional 2,400 jobs for a total employment impact of 8,902 jobs (Table 6.8).
- Businesses in Nevada's health sector had a combined payroll of \$6.4 billion in 2017 and when the income created in other non-health sector businesses, resulting from health sector operating activity, is included in the analysis, Nevada's health sector was responsible for an additional \$4.7 billion in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$11.0 billion (Table 6.9).
- Businesses in rural Nevada health sector had a combined payroll of \$263.7 million and when the income
  created in other non-health sector businesses, resulting from of health sector operating activity, is included
  in the analysis, the rural Nevada health sector was responsible for an additional \$100.5 million in personal
  income for a total payroll impact of \$364.2 million (Table 6.9).
- Currently, there are 14 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada: 6 are not-for-profit (publicly owned) hospitals, 4 not-for-profit (privately owned) hospitals, and 3 for-profit (privately owned) hospitals, and 1 not-for-profit (non-governmental) hospital (Table 6.10).
- In 2019, there are 10 rural and frontier community hospitals with provider-based rural health clinics (RHCs). There are also 7 non-hospital based Federally Qualified Health Clinics (FQHCs), and 13 tribal and Indian Health Service (IHS) clinics and health centers (Tables 6.11 through 6.13).

- In 2017, Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined 8,538 admissions, 27,875 inpatient days, an average stay of 3.5 days, an average daily census of 5.5, and an occupancy rate of 24.3% (Table 6.14).
- In 2017, rural and frontier hospitals had inpatient operating revenue of \$258.8 million or 25.0% of the total patient revenue; the outpatient revenue was \$774.7 million or 75.0% of the total patient revenue (Table 6.15).
- For 2017, rural and frontier hospitals had \$258.8 million in inpatient revenue and \$774.7 million in outpatient revenue totaling \$1.03 billion in total revenue. Outpatient revenue averaged 75.0% of total revenue (Table 6.16).
- In 2017, rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported an operating income loss of \$1.1 million. When Northeastern Nevada Regional Hospital is excluded from the analysis, the remaining 13 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported an operating income loss of \$20.1 million (Table 6.17).
- In 2017, rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported a net income of \$28.7 million. When Northeastern Nevada Regional Hospital is excluded from the analysis, the remaining 13 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported a net income of \$7.3 million (Table 6.18).
- In 2017, 45.0% of inpatient admissions, 36.0% outpatient admissions, and 23.5% of emergency department admissions were Medicare patients in Nevada hospitals (Tables 6.19 through 6.21).
- In 2017, 54.9% of inpatient admissions, 47.0% outpatient admissions, and 34.8% of emergency department admissions were Medicare patients in rural and frontier Nevada hospitals (Tables 6.19 through 6.21).
- In 2017, the top 5 types of admissions in rural areas were newborns, deliveries, septicemia, neonatal with other significant problems, and major joing replacements (Table 6.22).
- In 2017, the top 5 types of admissions in urban areas were psychoses, deliveries, newborns, septicemia, and neonatal with other significant problems (Table 6.23).
